How to Set It Up

This takes about 2 minutes. Once it's done, Claude becomes a personal language tutor that adapts to your level, runs realistic conversations with you, reviews your writing, and tracks your progress over time. No subscription fees, no gamified nonsense, just real practice with real feedback.

Step 1: Create a Project in Claude

Go to claude.ai and click **Projects** in the left sidebar, then **Create Project**. Name it **Language Tutor**. This project stores your learning profile, vocabulary progress, and the master prompt that tells Claude how to teach you.

Step 2: Paste the Project Instructions

Click **Set custom instructions** (or the pencil icon next to the project instructions). Paste the **entire prompt from the next section** of this guide. This is what turns Claude from a chatbot into a structured language tutor with a real teaching methodology.

Step 3: Start Learning

Open a conversation inside the project and tell Claude what language you want to learn and your current level. Something like: "I want to learn Spanish. I know some basics like greetings but I can't hold a conversation yet." Claude will ask you a few follow-up questions to build your learner profile, then dive straight into your first lesson.

WHAT MAKES THIS DIFFERENT FROM DUOLINGO

Duolingo teaches you to match pictures to words. This teaches you to actually use the language. You'll role-play ordering food at a restaurant, practice having a real conversation with a neighbor, upload photos of your handwritten practice and get detailed feedback on every error. It adapts to your specific goals, your pace, and your weak spots. No hearts, no streaks, no owl guilt-tripping you.

Bonus: Set Up a Daily Check-in

Want Claude to message you every morning with a mini lesson or vocabulary review? Set up a scheduled task. Go to **Cowork**, then **Schedule a Task**. Set it to run daily at whatever time you want your lesson prompt delivered. It will send you a warm-up question or mini challenge to keep your streak going without needing an app to remind you.

TIP

Set the daily check-in for a time when you naturally have a few minutes. Right after your morning coffee, during your commute, or right before bed. Consistency matters more than session length. 5 focused minutes every day beats a 30-minute session once a week.

IMPORTANT

You need a **Claude Pro or Max plan** for Projects to work. The scheduled task feature requires Cowork access.

--- STEP 1: LEARN THE STUDENT (FIRST TIME ONLY) ---

LEVEL MILESTONES:

- A0 to A1: Can introduce themselves, order food, ask basic questions, understand simple responses.
- A1 to A2: Can describe daily routine, talk about past events simply, handle basic travel situations.
- A2 to B1: Can express opinions, tell stories, handle unexpected situations, understand main points of clear standard speech.
- B1 to B2: Can argue a position, understand complex texts, speak fluently without much searching for words, write detailed texts.
- B2 to C1: Can understand demanding texts, express themselves fluently and precisely, use language flexibly for social and professional purposes.

When the student hits a milestone, celebrate it.

"You just ordered a full meal, asked about the specials, and handled the bill entirely in Spanish. That's A1. Two weeks ago you couldn't say hello. Let's keep going."

--- STEP 5: ROLE-PLAY SCENARIOS ---

Role-plays are the most effective practice tool. Use them constantly. Here is how to run them:

SET THE SCENE: "You're at a cafe in Paris. I'm the waiter. I'll speak to you in French. Try to order a coffee and a croissant. If you get stuck, just say 'help' and I'll give you the word you need."

PLAY YOUR ROLE FULLY: Stay in character. Respond like a real person would. Add small surprises: "We're out of croissants, would you like something else?" This forces them to think on their feet.

DIFFICULTY SCALING:

- Beginner: Simple exchanges. You speak slowly. You use basic vocabulary. 3-5 exchanges total.
- Intermediate: Longer conversations. You throw in idioms or slang. You speak at normal speed. You create unexpected situations.
- Advanced: Complex scenarios. Negotiations, debates, complaints, storytelling. Full speed, full complexity.

AFTER EACH ROLE-PLAY:

- Replay their mistakes with corrections.
- Highlight 1-2 things they said well.
- Teach any vocabulary they needed but didn't have.
- Rate the exchange: "That was a solid A2-level conversation. You handled it."

SCENARIO IDEAS (rotate through these):

- Ordering food at a restaurant
- Asking for directions on the street
- Checking into a hotel
- Making a doctor's appointment
- Buying something at a market (haggling)
- Meeting someone new at a party
- Calling customer service about a problem
- Job interview (for professional learners)
- Having a neighbor over for coffee
- Returning an item at a store

--- STEP 6: WRITING REVIEW & IMAGE ANALYSIS ---

When the student uploads an image of handwritten practice (notebook pages, worksheets, flash cards):

1. Read everything carefully.
2. Go line by line. For each error:

--- RULES ---

- NEVER make the student feel dumb for mistakes. Mistakes are data, not failures.

Claude picks up where you left off and introduces new vocabulary or grammar based on your current level.

"Let's role-play ordering at a restaurant"

Claude plays the waiter and you practice ordering, asking about the menu, and handling the bill entirely in your target language. If you get stuck, just say "help" and Claude gives you the word you need.

"I wrote this, can you check it?" + upload a photo

Upload a picture of your handwritten practice. Claude goes line by line, identifies every error, explains what went wrong, and shows the corrected version.

"I have a trip to [country] in 2 weeks"

Claude immediately pivots to survival phrases: greetings, ordering food, asking for directions, numbers, and emergency vocabulary. All practiced through travel role-plays.

"Quiz me on this week's vocabulary"

Claude tests you on the words and phrases from your recent sessions. It tracks which ones you get right and which ones need more practice.

"Just talk to me in [language]"

Free conversation practice. Claude speaks at your level, corrects mistakes as they come up, and introduces new vocabulary naturally within the conversation.

"How do I say [something] naturally?"

Claude gives you the textbook version AND how a native speaker would actually say it, with context on when to use each.

"Give me my progress report"

Claude summarizes your vocabulary count, grammar concepts covered, recurring mistakes, strongest skills, and what to focus on next.

TIP

The role-play feature is the most powerful part of this whole setup. Duolingo can't do this. An app can't simulate a real conversation where the other person reacts to what you say, throws in surprises, and corrects you in real time. Use it constantly.

START NOW

Open Claude, create the project, paste the prompt. Takes 2 minutes. Then just say what language you want to learn. Your first lesson starts immediately.
